OP ED FROM JUDGE STANLEY LEVINE & FALL EVENT

"What is America to Me?"



That is the first line of "The House I Live In," recorded in 1942 by Frank Sinatra in a movie short about prejudice.

After the events of Saturday in Pittsburgh, that question haunts me. I was born in the United States, and I am proud to be an American. Not a hyphenated American. Just American. I recently sang "God Bless America" at a judicial conference

and spoke about what that song means to me as the son of an immigrant.

For me as a Jew, this country has been a special place: For those in my generation, there were few bars to achieving success in life. I have had great faith that the ideas and ideals of our nation are stronger than the biases and prejudice that divide us.

And now that faith is shaken. I admit it. Regrettably, it is. And it pains me to say that.

That same song notes "the little town or city where my people lived and died" with great pride. Sadly, there is a city in America where my people, old Jews, died ... not of old age, but shot to death by an anti-Semitic madman.

I have lived in a time when 6 million Jews were killed because they were Jews, and now it has happened again. Not by the guns of a government, but they are still dead!

What is America to me? Today? A different place. I still love America, but I have lost something in my love.

So what do I do? I will not go out and buy a gun. I did that once when a stalker threatened me. I was not comfortable carrying it. And I will not choose this time to debate the second amendment.

No, I will choose to use my voice as my weapon to speak out against the prejudice and bigotry that pervade our discourse. I heard the chants of those who marched against Jews in Charlottesville, loud and clear. And despite what Donald Trump said, they are NOT "good people"!! And someone with the same beliefs just shot and killed my people in Pittsburgh.

I will stay in this country that I love. But when I hear hate spoken by anyone against any other person different than they are, I will forever remind them that hate produces killing. This has no place in America. And I will forever use my voice and heart and soul to silence it.

HOLOCAUST BUS TRIP WITH NEW TECH ACADEMY



A memorable feature of the annual Yom

Hashoah observances at The Temple the last few years has been the variety of visual creations memorializing the Holocaust exhibited in the Reception Hall following Remembrance services in the sanctuary. The first exhibits were presented only by students in Jeff Roberts' semester-long Holocaust Studies class at New Tech Academy at Wayne High School in Fort Wayne. In recent years classes from middle schools and other high schools in Northeast Indiana have also displayed their semester-end reports or artwork on specific aspects or individual histories of victims and survivors.

However, each year the works crafted by the students in Mr. Roberts' class were the ones that impressed me the most. I enjoyed meeting as many of those students at their exhibits each year as possible. Each deserved a personal congratulations on his/her quality work and hours of preparation. Each deserved a personal thank you for his/her interest in a subject that touches all Jews, in particular, everywhere, now and forever.

In the last couple years the Federation had rewarded students in Mr. Robert's classes at their conclusion each spring with an all-expense bus trip and admission to the Illinois Holocaust Museum in Skokie, IL. Federation executive director Jaki Schreier had introduced me to Mr. Roberts so I could express my gratitude to him directly. My reward: they invited me to accompany the 2018 class on its Spring trip.

The invitation intrigued me. I wanted to learn what was it about these students that would motivate them to sign up for an elective class focused on the darkest episode in modern world history. I was also

curious whether the Federation's investment in funding these annual trips was sound. Further, I have visited the U S Holocaust Museum in Washington D. C. and Yad Vashem in Jerusalem, but not the one in Skokie. So I joined Mr. Roberts and the 30 or so youngsters from his most recent class for the one-day trip.

Some observations about the demographics of the students that I gleaned: majority were White with a few Blacks, as many Latinos, and at least as many biracial/multiracial. Almost all lived in the southeast quadrant of town. None were Jewish or had any Jewish lineage that they knew of. Most had no Jewish friends or even knew anyone Jewish. They were from working-class families. More than half, I surmised, were not strangers to poverty and the constant temptations of "the streets". No designer apparel, no latest fashion.

An observation about their commitment to this trip: The trip was not mandatory; it was not a prerequisite to passing the class or improving one's grade. The bus left Wayne High School at 6:00 a.m. on Sunday, June 3. Many students held part-time jobs. For a few, that meant working Saturday night. Yet all but three students from the class of over 30 were on the bus, on time, at that early hour. This trip obviously meant a lot to them.

They were quiet on the four-hour trip to Skokie. Many dozed. For lunch we stopped at a McDonald's outside Plymouth, IN where we sat on outside benches and made peanut butter and/or jelly sandwiches assembly-line style. When we arrived at the Museum, the mood remained subdued, but out of reverence more so than from sleepiness or indifference.

The Museum orientation presented a special treat and surprise: our orientation leader was none other than Doris Fogel, long-time Fort Wayne resident, a former Federation executive director, and herself a Holocaust survivor from the Shanghai "detention camps". She had moved from Fort Wayne to Skokie a couple of

years ago to be with family. She did an excellent job, as well-spoken and sharp as ever.

During the tour of the Museum. I could not have been prouder of our contingent from Fort Wayne. Their discipline, deportment, and maturity stood out by contrast with the too-often boisterous, helterskelter viewing of other school groups who jammed the Museum. Two different docents asked me where our voungsters were from, whether they represented a Jewish school or youth group. This in preface to their commenting how well-behaved and how well-prepared they were, as judged by how intelligent and probing their questions were.

These were normal teen-age kids. On the bus ride home, the "opened up" a bit; and there was the usual kidding, teasing, and laughing you'd expect from young people. Nothing hurtful, nothing obnoxious, nothing negative. They liked one another; they cared for one another; they respected one another. It was so uplifting, so hope-inspiring to witness.

Did the lessons they learned about the Holocaust and man's inhumanity to man help shape their social attitudes and treatment of one another?

On the ride home, we stopped for dinner among a cluster of fast-food restaurants in Chesterton, IN. Each student was given ten dollars to spend for dinner as they chose at their choice of restaurants. They were grateful for the treat. We arrived back at Wayne High School at dusk after a positive, memorable experience.

My lasting impressions: the students in Mr. Robert's classes—at least these students that I observed—are blessed with much sensitivity and compassion for the plight of a people they have no connection or shared experience with. except their humanity. They are mature enough to understand that it is our humanity that bonds us all.

Mr. Jeff Roberts deserves so much credit for his students' mature, disciplined behavior. He leads and

teaches with "tough love", allowing each student to reap what he or she sows, insisting that they are accountable for their actions. He connects with his youngsters because he speaks their language, their idiom, their vernacular—but well short of crude "street talk". He has an easy sense of humor. He obviously cares deeply about his students, every one of them.

He learned about the Holocaust and developed his passion for teaching about it from the master, Dr. David Lindquist. He learned well, and he knows how to teach. He and his Holocaust Studies class at New Tech Academy are very popular. At the end of the semester, his students know their subject. They, our Jewish community, and the Fort Wayne community in general are better because of it.

VIGIL - STAND WITH PITTSBURGH

Rev. Dr. Bill McGill's moving words

We are here tonight because to do so is right, and to bear witness to the truth of Dr. King's contention that darkness can and always will be overcome by light. We are here to

denounce the spirit of vulgarity that feeds our nation's sense of polarity, and to announce that your African-American family stands with you in daily solidarity. We shall never forget the sacrifices you made to ensure that our ancestor's stones of freedom were laid. Not many know that it was a Jewish woman, Esther Brown, who instigated the lawsuit Brown versus Board that helped to establish academics' equality cord. Her husband was fired from his job and a cross was burned on their lawn, but they persevered until that night gave way to dawn. When the freedom rides began in 1961, nearly 2/3 of the white participants were Jewish, and we ultimately got another victory won. Among those clergy famously known as the Tallahassee 10, arrested for protesting Florida segregation, was Rabbi Israel Dresner who stood steadfast until integration experienced its installation. And Dr. King had no greater Jewish ally, than Rabbi Abraham Joshua Herschel, who he frequently referred to as my Rabbi.

So, no, we are not late to each other's table, because there have always been forces who wanted our freedom to be nothing but a fable. More than 228 years have now come and gone, since George Washington had to declare that equality lines for the Jews had already been drawn. To a Hebrew congregation in Newport, Rhode Island he wrote: "for happily the government of the United States, which gives to bigotry no sanction and persecution no assistance, may the children of the stock of Abraham who dwell in this land, continue to merit and enjoy the goodwill of the other inhabitants." And then he invokes the sage and salient words of the prophet Micah – "while everyone" shall sit in safety, under his own vine and fig-tree, and there shall be none to make afraid." Well, unfortunately, we do live in a nation where some of us are forced to be afraid, but we are here tonight to declare that our commitment to peace and justice has not decayed. Yes, tonight we are here because last Sabbath morning 11 precious lives had their humanity betrayed, and others were in need of

critical first-aid, but we are here to declare that being afraid will not cause us to abandon our righteous crusade. Yes, our confidence may have momentarily been swayed, and our hearts are still overwhelmingly dismayed, but we still have an unshakable belief that we are members of God's chosen brigade. Yes, I said we, because tonight we are all Jews just yearning to live free. Tonight, we are all Jews, irregardless of where we usually sit in our weekly worship pews. Tonight, we are all Jews, irregardless from whom we usually receive our denominational cues. Tonight, we are all Jews, irregardless of our documented theological views. Dr. King was right, "injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly." So, let us leave here tonight with a greater readiness to fight, until hate and intolerance is removed from our daily sight. Let us leave here tonight determined to stay in the fight, until our sense of community and cohesiveness is airtight. Let us leave here tonight, and refuse to just sit-tight, ignoring that justice and equality is our God-given birthright. Let us leave here tonight and demand that our leaders do right, because we need more than thoughts and prayers, we need those who will help create an environment where people no longer feel justified to look at others with hateful stares. We need more than thoughts and prayers, we need leaders who are not divisive and believe all Americans deserve equal shares. We need more than thoughts and prayers, we need concrete laws and policies that demand all citizens be treated as freedoms heirs. I know it's dark, but we must not allow our faith to shift into park. David, the psalmist of Israel was right. Weeping endures but for the night, because in the morning joy will come wondrously into sight. I know things are tight, but I still believe Charles Tindley was right. "harder yet may be the fight, right may often yield to might, wickedness a while may reign. Satan's cause may seem to gain; but, there is a God who rules above, with hand of power and heart of love. And if I'm right, he'll fight my battle, and I shall have peace one day." Amen
